Parsha Summary

- אַיִּי שָׂרָה Sarah Imeinu's life span of 127 years and the purchase of a burial place, Me'aras HaMachpelah in Chevron from Ephron.
- וֹלָקְחָתּ אָשָׁה Avraham sends his servant, Eliezer, to Charan to find a wife for his son, Yitzchak. He prays to Hashem for help and finds Rivka, the daughter of Avraham's nephew, Besuel.
- וַיֹּסֶף אָבְרָהֵם וַיִּקְּח אָשֵׁה Avraham remarries Keturah (Hagar).

However, we are taught by our Sages, that of all the mitzvos in the Torah, "Talmud Torah K'neged Kulam" – the study of Torah is equivalent to all the other mitzvos. The Vilna Goan (Shenos Eliyahu) explains that each and every word of Torah studied is considered its own separate mitzvah with Divine reward, unlike other mitzvos where we only receive one Divine reward for each act of mitzvah performed.

Ruchnius Is Priceless

In search of a daughter-in-law, Avraham entrusts Eliezer with the sacred and difficult mission of finding the next Matriarch - a woman who could be a spiritual partner for Yitzchok's greatness.

But it is not without hesitation:

Avraham said to his servant, the senior of his household, who was in charge of all that he owned, 'Place your hand under my thigh. I will have you swear by Hashem, God of heaven and God of earth, that you will not take a wife for my son from the daughters of the Canaanites, among whom I live (Bereishis 24:2-3).

Rabbi Chaim Soloveitchik zt"l sharply pointed out the text's priorities. Eliezer, Avraham's confidant par excellence on financial matters, does not receive a pass for all things spiritual; even after many years of loyal service, Eliezer must still vow allegiance to his matriarchal mission. **The message: life's greatest treasures don't have a cash value.**

Kindness Over Everything

ּוַתֹּאמֶר שְׁתֵּה אֶדֹנִי וַתְּמָהֵר וַתֹּרֶד כַּדָּהּ עַל־יָדָהּ וַתַּשְׁקְהוּ. וַתְּכֵל לְהַשְׁקְתוֹ וַתֹּאמֶר נַּם לֹנְמַלֶּיךְ אֶשְׁאָב עַד אָם־כּּלוּ לשתת:

"Drink, my lord," she said, and she quickly lowered her jar upon her hand and let him drink. When she had let him drink his fill, she said, "I will also draw for your camels, until they finish drinking." (Bereishis 24:18-19).

In this week's Parsha, Avraham's servant, Eliezer, goes on a mission to find a wife for Yitzchak. He asks for Hashem's help to find a *tzadekes* (a righteous woman), someone who does kindness and will offer him and his camels water to drink. Upon first seeing Rivkah, who happened to be on her way to draw water from the spring, Eliezer ran towards her. Why did he run to meet her? *Rashi* explains that when she came to draw water, the water automatically began to rise up on its own. R' Isaac Bernstein זצ"ל asks, shouldn't he have just scratched the test of having her give him and his camel water to drink? Water was miraculously coming up on its own! Why was the miracle not enough to determine that she was befitting for Yitzchak?

When Eliezer tells over the entire story and the miracles which had occurred to Yitzchak, Yitzchak doesn't immediately respond with excitement, but brings her into the tent of Sarah, his mother. Targum Onkelos explains, "Yizchak brought her into the tent, watched her, and noticed that she had

good deeds and attributes like his mother Sarah." Miracles don't say much about a person and are not a criteria for finding a soul mate. One must find out who the person really is.

Living Life to Its Fullest

Why does the Torah describe Avraham as zaken (elderly) and also as ba bayamim (advanced in years)? "Avraham was zaken [elderly], ba bayamim [and advanced in years], and Hashem blessed Avraham with everything" (Bereishis 24:1). Our Sages deduce from the repetition in the text's language that there are two reasons Avraham receives blessings at this stage in his life. One is that he was zaken and the other is that he was ba bayamim.

In Kiddushin 31a, the Talmud teaches that the adjective zaken is used to define a person who is older and has acquired wisdom over time. Avraham was blessed in the latter stage of his life first and foremost because he was a student of Hashem's wisdom. However, this alone is not the only reason he was so blessed. He was also ba bayamim. The connotation of ba bayamim is that Avraham applied his wisdom in a way that allowed him to use every day to its fullest.

How does one break bread on Shabbat?

The Shulchan Aruch (O.H. 274:1) writes that upon reciting the blessing of hamotzi over two loaves, one should break pieces off the bottom loaf to eat and to distribute to those gathered. The Rama (ibid.) adds that according to Kabbalah, one should break off the bottom loaf on Friday night and the top loaf on Shabbat day. The Bach (O.H. 274) questions this custom because it would seem that on Friday night one is passing over the top loaf in order to break off from the bottom loaf, which seems to contradict the dictum of En Ma'avirin Al Hamitzvot, that is, one should not pass up the opportunity to fulfill a Mitzvah. The *Taz (O.H. 274)* concurs and says that the remedy is to tilt the two loaves such that the bottom loaf is the first to be accessible for breaking off. Rabbi Ben Zion Abba Shaul (Or Lezion, vol II ch. 21, § 1) says that one should hold the two loaves side to side and hold the lower loaf closer to oneself.

Despite the Rama's ruling, the Kaf Hachaim (K.H., O.H. 274:2) and many Kabbalists write that one should always cut the top loaf. Nevertheless, Rabbi Amram Aburbia (Netive Am, pg.150) writes that upon close analysis of the *Arizal's* works, there is no mention of specifically giving preference to the top loaf. This may explain why Rabbi Baruch Toledano (Kitzur Shulhan Aruch), who normally follows the methodology of the Kaf Hachaim, actually concurs with the Rama's opinion. It should be noted that Rabbi Yitzhak Ratzabi (Olat Yitzhak, vol. II, § 122) says that the Yemenite custom is also like the Rama.

Summary: One should cut off pieces of bread from the lower loaf during the Shabbat night meal, and from the top loaf on the Shabbat day meal.


